This particular day we were driving all the way out to East Charlotte to look at this contemporary house that the owner had just left in the hands of the realtor to sell along with all the contents. You Want Character....Live on a Dirt Road by Mary Nobel

There has been a lot of complaining in the media, diners, coffee shops, etc., about poor road conditions, from pot holes to mud bogs, now flooding. We live on a dirt road, and, in fact, with each new Town Manager, we bring him or her a copy of a piece entitled "Dirt Roads". A quote from it says, "People who live at the end of dirt roads learn early on that life is a bumpy ride". Thus dirt roads give one character. We do not want our dirt road paved as we need all the "character" we can get. I guess "character" started when we had to walk to view this house with the realtor as the road was a mud bog – but we still bought it!

Just like our vintage cars, the roads we drive them on need maintenance. This is particularly true for dirt roads. Technically, of course, the Town is responsible for road maintenance, but they need a little help from the taxpayers to let them know what is needed and where. There are two approaches to doing this, the positive and the negative.

Although some people don't seem to understand this, the negative approach gets negative results and the positive approach gets positive results. With the negative approach, you make a phone call to the highest possible town managerial level, and speak loudly to be sure you are understood. Be sure to mention your credentials in terms of taxes paid and political clout. Also mention your assessment of their credentials and then explain what you want done. This will definitely get results. For example, during a winter snow storm, your road will be widely plowed, giving the mailman easy access to where your mailbox used to be. The positive approach doesn't require any phone calls. I've found that a periodic stop at the town garage with a tin of sticky buns or whoopee pies gets very positive results. Our road is frequently graveled, graded, raked and chlorided to keep the dust down. That's how they let me know when some more treats would be in order.

Just as a little attention and TLC keep our vintage cars running smoothly, the softer touch keeps the roads smooth. Now don't let me get started on people who feel a dirt road is a good place for their trash to be tossed. There is not enough room to cover that!

Use 2 cups of Bisquick or your own biscuit dough recipe, mix with enough milk to make a dough you can roll out easily. Roll this dough out to a 1 1/2 inch thickness and cut with a doughnut cutter to make the hole in the center, place these onto a buttered pan and pour Maple syrup to cover well. Bake until golden brown, about 30 minutes on 350 degree oven.

My Grandmother did it differently. Her recipe for this desert was made with biscuit dough, rolled out and spread with butter, maple sugar, rolled up and cut into slices to make a muffin. It was then baked to a nice brown. As the years rolled by with 10 in the family, a new recipe was made to make it easier and quicker.



As I moved more and more stuff away, it became apparent that it was indeed a complete Austin Healey 3000. The car had current plates and inspection, and in very good condition with a new top. This was too good to be true! And this guy had left instructions to sell everything? Apparently the listing agent had not taken the time or interest in seeing what was there. Because the listing had the owners name and number on it, I decided I would call him in New Jersey that evening to see if the car was also for sale. I couldn't wait to get home. I called and got a hold of him and asked about that green car in the garage. He said he was just fed up with everything and wanted out. Needless to say, I made him an offer and he accepted it. I was ecstatic! I wired him the money the next morning and out I went with my trailer to take my BRG BJ8 back to it's new home. All I needed to do to it was to get rid of the SU fuel pump and replace it with a modern electric. We then drove it for the next 25 years before doing a total restoration in 2007. For all the naysayers of British cars and specifically Lucas electrics, I have to say this is the most enjoyable car we own and have driven it many thousands of miles without once letting us down (knock on wood).

I did a complete restoration on the Healey, a '67 3000 BJ8; its actually 1 of the last 100 built and came to the US with hexagonal hub caps, as knock offs were illegal by the end of 1967. I had the hood louvered by one of the street rod guys, ventilation louvers cut into the sides of the front fenders like the factory racers had; helps it breathe a little better. The engine was done by Andy Costello, the body and

The Donald Healey Motor Co. was founded in 1945 in Warwick, England. The Healey Silverstone was the first sports car Donald Healey built. Other 'Healeys' in later generations were the Nash Healey, the Healey Duncan, the Sportmobile, the Tickford, the 100s, and the Sprite. The 3000s or Big Healeys were built from 1959 until production stopped in 1967. The final Healey was produced from 1972 until 1976 and was called the Jensen Healey. Donald Healey was born in Perranporth, England in 1898 and died there in 1988.

LAKE CHAMPLAIN BRIDGE DEDICATION UPDATE

Background: Since late January, I have been working with a citizen's committee from both New York and Vermont to ensure participation by VAE Members and their vintage automobiles in the official dedication ceremony for the new Lake Champlain Bridge slated for dedication in October. This significant and historic event will be part of a large two-day celebration that will likely attract several thousand spectators perhaps equaling the estimated 40,000 individuals who were part of the Aug. 26, 1929 dedication for the earlier bridge.

On Friday, June 10, Dave Sander, Gael Boardman, Leo Laferriere and I traveled to Crown Point N.Y. to meet with the Crown Point State Historic Site Manager, Thomas Hughes. Following an inspection of the grounds of the Old Fort Crown Point, initially selected for the VAE to stage a public display of their vehicles over the 2-day event, it was decided that the Old Fort parade grounds, built by the British, did not offer the desired visibility for vintage car owners or the general public celebrating the bridge's opening. Hence, after an in-depth discussion with site manager and museum director Hughes, a more preferred location was agreed to. In view of the two day aspect, those VAE members planning on staying overnight should take comfort in the fact there is New York's Crown Point state park on the grounds in the immediate area for overnight camping. Also there are nearby campgrounds at DAR State Park, Button Bay State Park, and Chimney Point State Park all nearby in Addison County, Vt. There are also commercial facilities.

JB Weld To The Rescue

Once again, my mail bag is empty. Since I have no questions to answer, I will write this month about a product I have used for years, but have been asked a lot of questions about lately. People have joked over the years that if it were not for "JB Weld" my cars would have fallen to the ground in pieces. In fact, there is a ring of truth to this.

"JB Weld" is a two-part epoxy product. It comes in several different flavors, but the concept is the same. There is a "JB Quick" that sets up in about five minutes, but once cured is not as strong as the original JB Weld. For applications immersed in water there is a JB Weld that sets up under water, appropriately called "JB Water Weld."

JB Weld has a cured tensile strength of 3,960 psi. Though it sets up in 4-6 hours but takes 24 hours to cure. Additionally, it is non-conductive (well-insulated) and can be filed, drilled, tapped, and painted. When fully cured, JB Weld is completely resistant to water, gasoline, and about every other petroleum product or automotive chemical. This epoxy will work in temperatures up to 500 degrees Fahrenheit, but will fail if heated beyond this point. **This epoxy sticks well to all metals.** However, it does not stick to flexible rubber, leather, vinyl, canvas or polypropylene plastic.

I first used JB Weld to fix a pot metal door lock assembly in my first Subaru Legacy. Somebody recommended it, and I reluctantly tried it. Much to my surprise, it worked. Since then, I have found countless uses for it over the years. The right side horn on the MG TD I recently restored is largely made out of JB weld. The horn is a cast assembly, and the throat of the horn was smashed, though the mechanical part of the horn still worked. Unfortunately, the throat of this horn is an unavailable part, so I decided I would try to repair it with the epoxy. Using the horn on the other side as a pattern, I was able to rebuild the throat of the horn with the epoxy. I have glued bolts on to broken-off studs and been able to back the stud out. I have fixed my wife's stainless steel pots and pans, using it to replace broken rivets, knobs and spot welds. It has held up to both the heat and the dishwasher. I have often used this epoxy in my model-making, using it as both a glue and to make my own cast model parts.

I have recently been asking people if they are familiar with this product. A number of people have told me that they use it, and use it often. Surprisingly, a few people have told me they either never heard of it, or have heard of it but never used it before.

Here are some tips for new users:

As with any type of adhesion, make sure the surface is clean and free of any grease or greasy residue. Clean the surface with soap and water and dry.


Before applying the epoxy, rough up the surface with sand paper or a wire brush and clean with acetone or lacquer thinner. Make sure you mix exactly 50% resin to 50% hardener. The mixture has to be close to 50-50 or it will not fully cure.

Allow the epoxy to cure before it is moved. I often use tape to hold the epoxy in place until it hardens. If this is not possible, use the JB Stick putty, as this will hold its shape until it cures.

Hopefully, **if your tool box isn't already well-stocked with JB Weld,** it will be soon! It has served me very well over the years, and I'm certain you will find it as indispensable as I have, if you haven't already enjoyed the benefits of this product.

Here is a picture of the spare tire carrier on the TC. A piece of the casting was broken off where the knock off threads in. I put some petroleum jelly on the threads of the knock off, threaded it in and filled in the missing piece with JB Weld. After it set up I unthreaded the knock off and shaped the epoxy with a file and sandpaper. You can see the epoxy contrast against the cast.


VAAS Board Meeting Minutes May 23, 2011

Board members Present: Andy Barnett, Gael Boardman, Lloyd Davis, Jan Sander, Dick Wheatley


Others Present: Gary Fiske, Wendell Noble

But, the only way to find more out, as in anything else, is to make the effort.


